

INTRODUCTION AND THE SITE

The Landscape Partnership Ltd was appointed by Attleborough Town Council in February 2024 to work with the client to review and develop a concept landscape masterplan and prepare landscape proposals associate with the proposed residential development north of Norwich road. The open grassland with a few mature trees is situated in a low lying area on the south side of the Attleborough Bypass of the A11 in Norfolk.


NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT AREAS & EXISTING USES





LANDSCAPE CHARACTER & KEY SITE FEATURES

Attleborough is part of the South Norfolk And High Suffolk Claylands (83) Landscape Character Areas within the Breckland District of East Anglia. The National Landscape Typology of the site is intermediate laying clayland, wooded (eastateland).

Local character include views that are frequently open, only sometimes confined by hedges and trees, with some woodland present. Small valleys support quite confined landscapes with intimate views. Heavy, seasonally waterlogged chalky clay soils occur on plateau areas, of better soils at the edges. Scattered areas of ancient woodland, game copses, shelterbelts, valley floor plantation and carr woodland as well as hedgerow trees provide a treed landscape character, despite much boundary loss.

The above viewpoint location map illustrate existing features and character of the site that consists existing trees hedgerows & grassland - mature oak trees on meadow and diverse, dense boundary planting screening along the A11. The mature hedgerows with group of trees along residential areas provide soft boundaries to the existing grassland

The site is within Flood Zone 1 (low risk zone), however groundwater flooding is a significant issue at lower points of the site. The figure also shows predicted long term flood mapping indicating that lower points along the embankment of the A11 of the northern side will be at risk in the future.


























OPEN PARKLAND CHARACTER AREA
